EQUALITY IMPACT ASSESSMENT AND ANALYSIS (EqIAA)

Alternative models for delivering youth services

SECTION 1 – INTRODUCTION

This review is to report on the investigation by officers in to alternative models for delivering youth provision in South Gloucestershire in accordance with the committee resolution in March 2016 on Positive Activities and for the Children, Adults & Health committee to determine on the preferred options for a future model.

The results of a public consultation regarding the future of the Positive Activity Subsidy (PAS) was considered by the CAH committee on 2nd March 2016 and members resolved that the PAS be renewed at a reduced level of £250k in year 1, £225k in year 2 and £150k in year 3 from 1 April 2016 until 31 March 2019 as a three year funding agreement, subject to annual Council budget approval. That officers continue to investigate alternative models of youth provision in South Gloucestershire, working with youth providers and Lead Members of the Committee.

An update at CAH Committee on 8th March 2017 agreed to:

- Combine the Positive Activity Subsidy (PAS), Priority Neighbourhood (PN) and Learning Difficulties and Disabilities (LDD) work together as part of the commissioning process.
- Protect the current levels of provision in PNs and for LDD young people.
- Ensure the type and location of activities provided is informed by a needs assessment
- Adopt a specific set of underpinning principles
- Develop the following preferred future model of provision which enables a smaller number (3-5) of lead providers, who can then form partnerships and/or subcontract:

Commission Several Hubs: Combine funds and commission to several organisations who then act as leads for provision across a range of providers.	Combine PAS and PN/LDD funds together as a single fund and produce a clear plan for what positive activities we want and where. Include PN + LDD at current or greater levels. Commission as several tenders to a number of lead organisations who will form partnerships/sub contract with a range of providers to deliver the
	contract.

SECTION 2 – RESEARCH AND CONSULTATION

A comprehensive "Positive Activities for Young People – Needs Assessment" has been conducted. This Needs Assessment has considered issues relating to the full range of protected characteristics as an integral part of its development from the outset and provides the full range of research results collected. This approach has ensured that equalities issues form a core consideration of the Youth Services Review, demonstrating its importance to Youth Services. Please see the full Needs Assessment for full details of the research conducted and the key equalities related issues emerging.

In addition, consultation was held between 14th September and 15th November 2017. Consultation involved events and surveys. The key equalities issues emerging from the consultation are an integral part of the Consultation Output Report. **Please see the full Consultation Output Report for full details of the key equalities related issues emerging**.

In addition, the survey results have been disaggregated according to protected characteristic group. Please see Appendix 1 of this EqIAA document to view the findings.

The approach taken to analysing and assessing equalities related impacts and issues has been comprehensive from the outset, ensuring that equalities has formed an integral part of this review from the outset. The findings shows in the Needs Assessment, the Consultation Output Report and Appendix 1 to this EqIAA clearly demonstrate this. The critical element of a successful EqIAA is that the intelligence and information gathered is used to ensure that equalities issues are addressed. Sections 3 and 5 of this EqIAA detail the actions which will be taken as a result of the research findings.

SECTION 3 - IDENTIFICATION & ANALYSIS OF EQUALITIES ISSUES AND IMPACTS

A wide range of issues have been identified for integrating within youth services these will form a core part of the commissioning process as follows:

CONSIDERATION FOR COMMISSIONING 1: DENSITY

Balance the needs of young people living in the more populated areas whilst considering reasonable access to positive access for those young people living in less densely populated areas.

CONSIDERATION FOR COMMISSIONING 2: GROWTH & DEVELOPMENT

Areas of growth should be considered when planning future youth provision. Mobile / flexible provision could be considered for some areas.

CONSIDERATION FOR COMMISSIONING 3: LOCATION OF PROVISION

The location of activities should reflect areas of higher need, including poverty outside the priority neighbourhoods.

CONSIDERATION FOR COMMISSIONING 4: BREADTH OF PROVISION

Ensure both a geographical spread of provision and a range of activities are offered.

CONSIDERATION FOR COMMISSIONING 5: CHILDREN IN CARE

Ensure that providers understand the barriers Children in Care face in accessing positive activities and include strategies to address this.

CONSIDERATION FOR COMMISSIONING 6: LGBTQ+ YOUNG PEOPLE

Future commissioning should include specialist LGBQT+ provision that meets the needs of this group.

CONSIDERATION FOR COMMISSIONING 7: MENTAL HEALTH

Provision should include opportunities to promote positive mental health & wellbeing to young people through the programme of activities. Young people in need of support should be helped to access the relevant services.

CONSIDERATION FOR COMMISSIONING 8: RACE

Provision must be inclusive and ensure that it is accessible to all young people regardless of ethnic and cultural background.

Providers should understand the barriers BAME young people face in accessing positive activities and include strategies to address this.

Provision should include and encourage opportunities for young people from different backgrounds to mix.

CONSIDERATION FOR COMMISSIONING 9: YOUNG PEOPLE WITH LDD

Continue to provide bespoke youth provision for young people with LDD.

Ensure that providers understand the barriers young people with LDD face in accessing positive activities and include strategies to address this.

CONSIDERATION FOR COMMISSIONING 10: PHYSICAL HEALTH

Provision should include opportunities to promote positive physical health (healthy weight, healthy nutrition and physical activity) & wellbeing to young people through the programme of activities.

CONSIDERATION FOR COMMISSIONING 11: SUBSTANCE MISUSE

Provision should include opportunities to raise awareness of the impact of substance abuse to young people through the programme of activities.

Young people in need of support should be helped to access the relevant services.

CONSIDERATION FOR COMMISSIONING 12: SEXUAL HEALTH & RELATIONSHIPS

Provision should include opportunities to promote sexual health and healthy relationships in young people through the programme of activities.

Young people in need of support should be helped to access the relevant services.

CONSIDERATION FOR COMMISSIONING 13: CHILD SEXUAL EXPLOITATION

Providers need to be able to identify young people who are at risk of CSE and link them to support or refer them to child protection services.

Provision should include opportunities to promote healthy relationships to young people through the programme of activities.

CONSIDERATION FOR COMMISSIONING 14: EDUCATION & ACHIEVEMENT

Provision should include opportunities for all young people to maximise their potential by learning new skills, building confidence and raise aspiration.

Provision should also provide positive development pathways for young people through opportunities for accreditation, development and volunteering.

CONSIDERATION FOR COMMISSIONING 15: NEETS

Provision should include opportunities for young people to overcome barriers to participate in education, employment or training opportunities.

CONSIDERATION FOR COMMISSIONING 16: YOUNG CARERS

Providers need to be able to identify young carers, understand the potential impact of caring and support them to access additional support.

CONSIDERATION FOR COMMISSIONING 17: ANTI-SOCIAL BEHAVIOUR

Provision should be flexible so it can contribute to efforts to address pockets of anti-social behaviour by young people.

CONSIDERATION FOR COMMISSIONING 18: YOUNG PEOPLE WHO OFFEND

Providers should collectively work with young people who are engaged in the youth justice system.

Providers should build strong links with the Youth Offending Service to encourage participation in positive activities by young people at risk of offending.

CONSIDERATION FOR COMMISSIONING 19: YOUTH HOMELESSNESS

Providers need to help young people better understand their current/future housing options and housing related issues.

Providers need to help identify young people who are at risk of becoming homeless and signpost them to support services.

CONSIDERATION FOR COMMISSIONING 20: ACCESS AND SUPPORT

Providers must ensure they understand the barriers that young people face in accessing a wide range of positive activities and support them to overcome this.

Providers should engage appropriately trained staff to work with young people.

These considerations for commissioning have emerged as a result of the assessment of issues within the Needs Assessment and the consultation, and clearly include a full range of equalities issues. These considerations will form a central part of the commissioning process. All providers wishing to provide youth services will be expected to demonstrate their capability and capacity to deliver outcomes against all of the considerations, with equalities forming a core part of commissioners assessment of tenders.
