Sleeping Bag (or blanklets) for each person travelling.		
Additional warm clothing including hats and gloves.		
Waterproof coat and trousers.		
Flask containing a hot drink.		
Snow Shovel.		
Wellington Boots.		
Tow rope (if not already included).		
Ice scraper/de-icer.		_
Salt/grit.		_
Hot Weather		_
Cold drinks.		
Shade (such as an umbrella).		
Coolbox.		
Sun Screen.		_

Even on shorter journeys you can become stranded in your vehicle.

Before each journey pause to think about what you would do should you get stranded.



If severe weather such as snow threatens think very carefully before setting off on a journey - get an updated weather forecast, check your vehicle thoroughly before setting off, and leave plenty of time for your journey. Keep listening to local radio broadcasts for updates on the road conditions and weather.
