South Gloucestershire Council Infrastructure Funding Statement 2022/23



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1. Introduction

The Infrastructure Funding Statement (IFS) is an annual report detailing the financial and non-financial contributions secured by the Council through planning obligations within South Gloucestershire for the given financial year. Schedule 2 of the Community Infrastructure Levy (Amendment)(England) (No.2) Regulations 2019 Regulation 121A – Annual infrastructure statement details what should be included in the Infrastructure Funding Statement.

The 2022/23 is the fourth annual IFS produced by South Gloucestershire Council.

Planning obligations is a collective term used for CIL and S106. Income is used to help fund the provision of supporting infrastructure in association with development. They are also known as developer contributions.

The council has produced a 'frequently asked questions' factsheet about S106 and CIL which can be accessed from our website.

2. Section 106 Planning Obligations

Section 106 agreements are legal agreements containing planning obligations which can be attached to a planning permission to mitigate the impact of a development.

Obligations can only be sought where they are directly related to the development, are fairly and reasonably related in scale and kind to the development and are necessary to make the development acceptable in planning terms (National Planning Policy Framework paragraph 204).

The council's requirements for S106 planning obligations are set out in the CIL & S106 Planning Obligations Guide.

S106 contributions are paid to contribute to specific items of infrastructure listed in the agreement and can either be provided onsite, for example through the provision of affordable housing, a new school or public open space, or off-site in the form of financial payments. The timing of financial contributions within a S106 agreement are usually based upon triggers attached to the buildout of the development site.

There are occasions where the Council will forward-fund an infrastructure project and recoup their costs from a number of different S106 agreements over time. For example, the North Fringe to Hengrove Project has been funded by numerous S106 contributions, many of which have yet to commence on site and so it may be some years before the Council receives all of the income to cover its expenditure.

S106 Income

Detailed below in Table 1 is the total amount of S106 **capital contributions received** in 2022/23 broken down into category of infrastructure type. In addition to capital receipts, much of the infrastructure related to new development is delivered directly developers, such as on-site Affordable Housing, highways and drainage infrastructure, public open spaces etc. The table below in the main relates to contributions towards the provision or enhancement of off-site infrastructure and therefore does not show all the community benefits arising from new development. Further details are provided in later sections of this report.

Community Infrastructure Levy

CIL is a tariff-based charge on the development of new floor space. In contrast to S106 obligations, CIL may be used to fund infrastructure not directly related to the development from which the levy was raised, so can contribute towards requirements across the district in order to support existing and new communities. CIL monies can be used to fund the provision, improvement, replacement, operation or maintenance of infrastructure.

CIL Rates must be set out via a published <u>charging schedule</u>. This schedule was adopted in March 2015 and came into effect in August 2015. Further information can be found here.

The council has produced a 'frequently asked questions' factsheet about s106s and CIL which can be accessed from our website.

Following the CIL Legislation, 80% of receipts are allocated towards infrastructure projects, up to 5% is used for the administration of CIL and the remaining 15% is passed directly to the Parish or Town Council where the development took place. If the development took place in the unparished area of South Gloucestershire the funds are allocated to a reserve from which the locally elected Ward Members will decide what projects are funded in their areas. Unused Administration receipts will be transferred to the Capital pot for allocation to capital infrastructure projects.

If a Parish or Town Council have an adopted Neighbourhood Plan they will receive 25% of the CIL income collected in their area instead of 15%, reducing the Capital amount from 80% to 70%.

The following councils have completed or are currently at an advanced stage of preparing their Neighbourhood Plans:

- Charfield Parish Council: Made 22nd September 2021
- Oldbury Parish Council: Made 18th May 2022
- Pilning & Severn Beach Parish Council: currently in preparation, consultation on draft NP expected 2023. Plan expected to be completed and made during 2024.
- Thornbury Town Council: Made 18th May 2022

• Filton Town Council: Neighbourhood Area was designated on 21 September, awaiting further details from FTC NPG to understand their ambitions, intended scope and timetable for preparing their Neighbourhood Plan.

Neighbourhood CIL

15% (or 25% where there is an adopted NDP) of the total CIL receipts are passed to the Parish/Town Council where the development has taken place for them to spend directly on infrastructure. This occurs on April 30th following the end of the financial year.

They can spend these funds on:

- the provision, improvement, replacement, operation or maintenance of infrastructure; or,
- anything else that is concerned with addressing the demands that development places on it.

Funds transferred to Parish Councils

The Neighbourhood CIL collected in the year is transferred to parish and town councils on or around the 30th April following the close of the financial year.

In April 2023 £794k was transferred to parish and town councils.
